2. Seminar on Responsible Handling of Strays


This seminar was jointly organized by Cat Welfare Society and Mutts and Mittens. AVA also extended a talk on their current guideline, the implication to the companies and their handlers, and how the law is interpreted. Held on 14th July, at Republic Polytechnic, the seminar sought to impart to participants the importance of handling methods when dealing with stray cats and dogs, as well as guidelines on more responsible and humane handling of the animals. Participants of this talk included pest management professionals across the industry as the handling of strays is often part of the pest control contract. By the end of the seminar, participants had covered the following topic areas:

- a. Good understanding on the legal requirements and guidelines
- b. How to identify and handle stray cats.
- c. The legal implication to their staff and the directors for non-compliance. A pest management company has already been convicted and given that contract sums for this removal is small, then it is advisable that the law is understood and necessary precautions are taken
- d. A practical hands-on experience

The above topic area gave participants a good idea of the importance of responsible handling of strays especially from the perspective of the humane handling of animals, as well as the legal consequences of animal abuse.

Following this seminar, there were a number of proposed areas where follow up action was deemed necessary:

- e. Follow-up proposed for action was to have a template drafted to ensure compliance with WSH
- f. Follow-up on guidelines for clients with regards to tender specifications and have instead recommended guidelines for joint legal compliance
- g. Follow-up for template to extend to clients with regards to clarification
- h. Follow-up for a certification course conducted with AVA to ensure staff are trained and encouragement of clients to engage with trained personnel. AVA will explore whether this can be added to the NEA-ITE course.



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3. Meeting with IDA

This took place on 7th July. EMAS met with IDA to explore the possibility of the application of technology incorporating IT to benefit companies. The overall sentiment was that members of EMAS coming together to implement this in their companies, as a cluster, would result in increased savings for all. EMAS is currently looking at ways to approach this with IT associations or with independent vendors. It is hoped that we can find a common platform that will be of benefit to all members as part of membership. As such, EMAS plans to hold an educational talk on this and more related developments. This will be updated in the coming months. We look forward to your attendance and engagement in the upcoming seminar.

4. Business Study Trip for Cleaning Companies.

This trip kicked off on the 19th July with a total number of about 10 companies and several government ministries flying off to Sydney for the trip. The aim was to understand how the cleaning industry is managed in Australia. Collectively the trip allowed participants to cover the following topic areas:

- a. To understand how they operate without an increased dependency on a foreign workforce
- b. To understand how they attract and retain cleaners in Australia
- c. To understand how training and skills are promoted in Sydney
- d. To understand how technology can be adopted and incorporated in tenders
- e. To understand how productivity is adopted and measured in contracts
- f. To understand how they manage the image of the industry
- g. To also better understand the role the association has on the industry
- h. To understand the role government has with regards to policy and improvements for the industry Overall it was a fruitful trip as cleaning companies here had a chance to see how similar companies operate in Australia, and to then bring these ideas back to the Singapore marketplace and to see how this can be effectively adopted to create our own uniquely Singapore success story. In such a way, the industry here would have a chance to grow and develop along the lines of greater capabilities.



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Next up, are events planned for the month of August, which EMAS is organizing for all members. These events will give all members a chance to engage with government, to find out more about industry related policies, thus EMAS encourages all members to block out those dates!
